A function of the settle-ment suggestion made by Fed-eral Conciliator Arthur Viat, the workers get:

he workers get: A 5 cent an hour pay boost retroactive to June 21; Another 4 cent increase ef-fective March 1, 1956; A third hike of 3 cents on December 1, 1956; Six paid holidays for main-tenance workers (operating personnel already had them under the old contract); Three week vacation after twelve years of service and four week vacations after

four week vacations after twenty-five years (against three weeks after fifteen years in the old contract); and

Increased guarantees of ad-ditional work for extra men. The new contract runs to May 31, 1957.

## Vote Hailed—

Verne Stambaugh, president the union's Division 192, the union's Division of the favorable vote. of He hailed said:

"I am grateful the member-ship has accepted the Federal conciliator's recomendations by such a large majority. Every effort was made to settle this dispute amicably in the best interest of the community." 9

Glen Stanley, Key System president, likewise expressed pleasure that a strike was averted but he warned that the settlement "imposes new bur-

dens on the company." Key now has an application for a fare increase before the State public utilities commis-sion and Stanley hinted all of its
