

UC PROFESSOR FOUND DEAD

Egon Brunswik, 52 year old professor of psychology of the University of California, was found dead yesterday in the wooded hills west of the Stanford University campus.

Undersheriff Walter Moore of San Mateo County tentatively put the cause of death as suicide. Palo Alto police earlier in the day put out a bulletin that Brunswik was missing and had showed signs of suicidal intent.

WIFE LECTURER.

Brunswik's wife, Else Frenkel-Brunswik, a lecturer in psychology at the Berkeley campus, has been on leave of absence to study at the Institute of Behavioral Studies on the Stanford campus.

Brunswik's body was found about a quarter of a mile off Portola Road by David Mello, 1760 Mayview Avenue, Palo Alto, as he walked along a bridle path.

There were no signs of violence. Two pill bottles were found nearby, one empty and the other partly filled. His 1942 sedan was parked on Portola Road.

EXPERT IN WORK.

Brunswik's colleagues at Cal said he was one of the leading psychologists in the world. A graduate of the University of Vienna, he taught there until he came to Berkeley in 1937 and was made a full professor in 1940.

He taught psychological theory and the history of psychology on the graduate level and has authored several books. Friends said he recently underwent surgery for a circulatory ailment and had stopped all activity for the past two months to recuperate for the fall session.
