## Shanghai Family That Fled Reds Is Reunited

Five years of waiting and hoping ended for Frank Chiu yesterday the moment he spotted his wife and six smiling children on the deck of the President Wilson.

Because his was a special case, the genial insurance sales-

man was allowed to board the incoming vessel from an American President Lines launch and greet the family he had not seen since he moved them from the Red China mainland to Hong Kong in 1950.

And for Mrs. Rowena Chiu

and the youngsters—Elizabeth, 20; James, 17; Frank Jr., 16; Mary, 13; Shirley, 7, and George, 6—the happy reunion signaled the start of a life free from the terror of Communism.

### ON RED BLACKLIST.

Chiu explained that in 1949 and 1950, when he was business manager for General Claire Chennault's airline in China, his name and the names of his wife and children were put on the Communist blacklist.

"The Communists made our life in Shanghai unbearable, so I smuggled the family out and took them to Hong Kong," Chiu said.

In late 1950 Chiu made a business trip to San Francisco, and with the aid of American-Chinese welfare agencies decided to stay here and prepare a home for his family.

"I had hoped the family could come right away, but we had to wait until they could get the permission of immigration officials," he said.

### RECOGNIZED.

Chiu was surprised that his four oldest children remembered him. He agreed with his wife that Shirley and little George, who were infants when he last saw them, will have to get used to having their father around.

Chiu plans to enroll the children, all of whom speak English well, in school next month. Mary, Shirley and George will attend public schools near their Richmond district home at 575 Thirty-third Avenue, and James and Frank will attend George Washington High School.

Elizabeth will attend Notre Dame College in Belmont or San Francisco College for Women.

### TEACHERS ARRIVE.

Another group of arrivals on the President Wilson was thirty Japanese high school teachers who will attend American colleges on Fulbright scholarships.

The teachers, headed by Toshio Ikegaya of Tokyo, will leave for Washington, D. C., today for a two week orientation course before being assigned to colleges throughout the country.

All are English teachers in Japan's growing high school system. They will study American methods of teaching.
