

Mixup Over Who Will Study Einstein's Brain

PRINCETON (N. J.), April 19.—(AP)—A professional tangle developed today over plans of pathologists to study the brain of Albert Einstein, which the scientific genius willed to science.

Princeton Hospital announced today a group of pathologists, headed by Dr. Thomas S. Harvey, of the hospital, would conduct the brain study.

John W. Kauffman, administrator of Princeton Hospital, told of an earlier report that Einstein's brain would be taken to Montefiore Hospital laboratory, New York, for the study, said:

"The brain will not leave Princeton Hospital."

Dr. Harry M. Zimmerman,

chief of the laboratory division of Montefiore Hospital, and professor of pathology at Columbia University, was announced earlier in the day as the man to conduct the study.

A Montefiore Hospital spokesman said Einstein's brain was to be delivered there today.

Commenting on the Montefiore Hospital announcement, Kauffman said:

"There's just nothing to it."

Kauffman said the brain would rest in solution at Princeton Hospital for a few days to harden before the group of pathologists begin work on it.

A Montefiore Hospital spokesman, told of Kauffman's statement, said the latest information received at Montefiore from Doctor Harvey was that the

brain would be delivered there today.

The Montefiore spokesman said Dr. Harvey had asked if the New York laboratory facilities would be available and was told they were. The spokesman also said Doctor Zimmerman had been asked to head the

pathology study and had accepted. However Doctor Harvey said Zimmerman was

going to be only a consultant in the study and that there are no plans to move the brain.
