

JUDGE SCORED ON JUE CASE

Representative Francis E. Walter, Democrat of Pennsylvania, declared in Washington yesterday that Federal Judge Oliver D. Hamlin "ought to be impeached" for his recommendation against deportation of George K. Jue.

Jue, a prominent Chinatown restaurateur and former president of the Chinese Chamber of Commerce, was convicted last year of conspiring to defraud the Government through a passport visa racket. He served five months of a year and a day Federal prison sentence.

In passing judgment on the Chinatown leader on February 16, 1954, Judge Hamlin recommended against his deportation on the grounds that he had been active in many civic and community affairs.

BILL SHELVED.

Walter's attack on the judge came as his judiciary subcommittee shelved a bill by San Francisco Congressman John F. Shelley which would have permitted Jue to remain in the country.

Judge Hamlin, the Pennsylvania Congressman said, "ought to mind his own business." Walter called Jue the "leader of a smuggling ring." The judge was not available immediately for comment.

Jue's conviction was based on testimony that he had obtained false passports for thirty-five Chinese who entered the country illegally in 1950. One of the chief witnesses was John Wayne Williams, ousted United States vice consul at Hong Kong, who was fired as a homosexual and sent to prison for accepting \$10,000 in bribes from Jue.
