When a gown is built right up to the neckline it is likely to be of the dress material and frankly high necked with a little collar. Others are deeply open throated.

Sleeves also have changed. They are now of many lengths, the short ones giving a new look to bridal dresses. As you will see, bridal dresses have kicked over the traditional traces this season and have much more individuality.

Even the fabrics are widely varied from the slipper satin of other years. Now many of the finest gowns are fashioned of lace (rosepoint, Chantilly and re-embroidered alencon). Many fall brides will also be married in tulle.

Three of the newest colors for

bridesmaids are decidedly bright rather than pastel. They are emerald green, purple and cardinal red. Many of the brides to be are choosing these colors for their attendants.

The show taking place on Saturday builds up to romantic finale. A bride gown that is a drift of rosepoint lace made with a three tiered skirt, each tier edged in tulle. The neckline is cut out in the newest fashion to show the lace pattern.

The bridesmaid in this show will wear a short ruby red crystalette redingote caught with bows over a panel of tiny pink ruffles—reminiscent of a fairy tale "Bo-Peep."—Illustrating the importance of dramatic colors.
