

# Young GOP Leader Quits In Row on Convention Site

A dispute between San Francisco and Palo Alto Young Republicans over the site of the 1956 State convention yesterday resulted in the resignation of Mrs. Claire Bergrun, president of Santa Clara County's Young Republican organization.

Mrs. Bergrun said she was resigning "because I disagree with the meek attitude of our Santa Clara group in this convention site dispute. I am disappointed in their failure to get tough, and have no enthusiasm to continue."

## PALO ALTO SITE.

The 1956 convention was assigned to Palo Alto during a meeting of the State executive board. Subsequently, Attorney John A. Busterud of San Francisco, president of the State Young Republican organization, objected. He suggested that San Francisco be named instead of Palo Alto.

Busterud based his objection on an assertion that Rick

ey's Studio Inn in Palo Alto, scheduled to be the headquarters for the convention, does not have sufficient facilities to handle all the delegates expected.

He added that Mrs. Bergrun, during her appearance before the State executive board, did not give the board "all the necessary facts." He has appointed a six man study committee to examine the facilities at Rick

## GUBSER CHARGE.

Republican Congressman Charles Gubser of Santa Clara County, joining forces with the Young Republicans in his own county, has charged that "it would be morally wrong to take the convention away from Palo Alto." He added that "I'll fight to prevent such cancelation, up to the highest possible level."

Busterud replied, in a letter to Gubser, that "you have not been informed of all the facts."

The 1955 convention was held in San Diego.

## TENSIONS EASER:

The premier said tensions have relaxed considerably in the Orient in recent months.
